DBIA gets high marks in customer service passenger survey

What's not to like? That's what passengers are saying about their Daytona Beach International Airport experience, according to a recent survey.

Four Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University students recently presented findings of the annual customer satisfaction survey conducted at Daytona Beach International Airport last fall.

The survey was conducted over two weeks and at various travel times.

The largest majority of passengers said they chose DBIA for its convenient location and expressed increased satisfaction with the airport's services and facilities compared to a similar survey conducted last year.

Favorable customer conveniences include the mail back program, where items surrendered to the TSA during security screening are mailed back to passengers at no cost to the passenger. Other conveniences include the courtesy parking lot shuttle service, free wireless Internet service, Internet workstations, and free weather and flight tracking. ✈️

Chamber's trip highlights ease of D.C. service

A recent trip to Washington D.C. illustrated the cost savings and convenience of flying to the nation's capitol from Daytona Beach on the new service offered by United airlines.

The trip was the annual Community Leader and Chamber Washington Fly-In hosted by Congressman John Mica. The venture was sponsored by The Chamber: Daytona Beach and Halifax Area.

The annual Fly-In event provides a forum to update delegates on federal issues.

Unlike past years when the nonstop service wasn't available from Daytona

Mica assists DBIA with runway improvement grant

U.S. Congressman John Mica has announced award of a \$2.3 million federal grant to Daytona Beach International Airport for the design, purchase and installation of a new instrument landing system and medium approach lighting system for the airport's main runway.


"We're grateful for Congressman Mica's support on this much-needed airport improvement project," said DBIA Director of Aviation Dennis McGee.

The new landing and lighting systems will upgrade and improve operating efficiency and enhance safety at the airport. The

ILS system is a critical navigation aid that enables pilots to land during inclement weather or reduced visibility conditions. DBIA's flight schools, commercial airlines, and general aviation pilots use this instrumentation extensively throughout the year with peak use during special events, such as the Daytona 500 when hundreds of aircraft arrive and depart the airport in highly compressed time periods, according to the airport's Steve Cooke.

"Daytona Beach International Airport is the 33rd most active towered airport in the United States for landings and takeoffs and


is the 20th most active in the United States for radar controlled approaches," he said. "Only Miami International and Orlando International Airports have more radar-controlled approaches transiting their airspace within the state."

The new system, including design, installation and certification, is projected to cost \$2.5 million. Ninety five percent of the funding is being provided through an FAA grant with the balance divided equally between the Airport the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).

Beach, this year's delegation was able to fly nonstop from Daytona Beach International Airport on United Express.

Parking and check-in were a snap for United's 11:24 a.m. departure. Flight time was 90 minutes. Upon arrival, the delegation used the Washington Super Shuttle service (800-258-3826) to get downtown and within 30 minutes, the capitol dome was in view. The Super Shuttle service includes a fare of approximately \$22 approximate for the first person and \$10 for each additional person (time based on destination), a fraction of the cost for a cab ride to downtown. Super Shuttle offers fast, convenient service between all downtown Washington hotels and Washington-Dulles International Airport.

"Everyone agreed this year's trip could not have been easier," said the airport's Steve Cooke. 

Traveling through DBIA a smart, economical decision

Whether traveling for business or pleasure, Volusia County residents make a smart choice when they "Fly Daytona First".

Daytona Beach International Airport connects passengers to hundreds of domestic and many international destinations though nonstop daily flights to Washington D.C., New York/Newark, and Atlanta.

Choosing DBIA can save time and money. DBIA travelers can do a travel analysis to get a more complete picture of the costs associated with travel. DBIA promotes a program called Travel Quality Management (TQM), as part of the ongoing efforts to inform customers of the comparative cost of air travel at Daytona Beach compared with other airports.

The TQM program provides an "apples-to-apples" comparison for travel from Daytona Beach International Airport compared to its closest competitive airports — Orlando and Jacksonville. The TQM approach measures the fare difference, mileage expense, gas expense, tolls and parking between airports, so the complete cost of travel can be compared between airports.

"If travelers consider all of the cost factors when choosing an airline and an airport, DBIA is often a better bargain than alternate airports," said Stephen Cooke, director of business development. "One factor that is invaluable is the time you

save traveling through DBIA."

The most recent concern for travelers is the rising cost of fuel. According to the Energy Information Administration, a group that monitors the national energy statistics for the United States Government, the cost of fuel rose 18 cents to an average price of \$2.93 per gallon in the lower Atlantic region during only one week in May. At \$2.93 a gallon, driving 165 miles round trip from Volusia County to Orlando's airport will add \$32.23 to the whole trip, assuming vehicle mileage of 15 miles per gallon.

Compare these costs with living in Ormond Beach and getting dropped off for

your flight at DBIA and the savings is truly substantial. If you park your car for a week in Orlando, this adds another \$105 to the trip cost. Overall, travel through Orlando International Airport raises the gas expense, triples the parking fees, adds over an hour in drive time and even could be more expensive if you choose toll roads.

Continental Airlines passenger loads increase at DBIA

During April, Continental Airlines reported passenger loads of 91 percent at Daytona Beach International Airport, compared with an 80 percent load factor in April 2005. The increase is due in part to the fleet change made by Continental in December. Continental changed aircraft from the 50-passenger regional jet to the 124-passenger Boeing 737.

Bigger planes this year also meant more passengers with 6,441 passengers reported in April compared to 3,780 passengers in April 2005 — an increase of 70 percent for the Houston-based carrier.
