

MA-30 Homeless Facilities and Services – 91.210(c)

Introduction

Volusia County's homeless facilities include emergency shelters, transitional housing and permanent supportive housing beds that are maintained by various agencies located throughout the County. Several agencies are specialized in the specific homeless and non-homeless special needs populations that they serve such as: domestic violence victims and their families, alcohol and drug abuse addiction, and developmentally disabled.

Describe mainstream services, such as health, mental health, and employment services to the extent those services are used to complement services targeted to homeless persons

Volusia County has an array of service providers to assist homeless persons who are referred into housing. With the inception and implementation of a homeless coordinated intake and assessment process, it is becoming easier to identify families and individuals' specific needs related to housing and supportive services such as mental health, substance abuse, food assistance, financial assistance, educational needs, and vocational/job assistance. Agencies like SMA Behavioral partner with housing providers to offer assistance with mental health needs and targeted case management. Other housing service providers such as Catholic Charities, Neighborhood Center of West Volusia, Family Renew Community, Halifax Urban Ministries, Domestic Abuse Council, Salvation Army and numerous faith based organizations provide assistance. A majority of the nonprofit agencies have outreach and case management services which provide assistance and referral as appropriate to clients' specific needs; these referrals include Rapid Re-Housing (RRH), Housing First opportunities through the Supportive
