### **Central Services**

• TCK Building Elevator Refurbishment: The bid for this project was awarded by the County Council on Jan. 10. All five elevators in the building will be refurbished and modernized. Every component will be replaced and modernized, with the exception of the steel elevator cabs. A preconstruction meeting has been conducted with the awarded vendor. The project will begin in a few weeks. One or two elevators will be out of service at a time. The project will take four to six months to complete.

### Information Technology

Building Footprints now in GIS: Information Technology has received from the Florida Geographic
Information Office a new set of data which adds over 223,000 building footprints to the county's mapping
software. These building outlines were automatically generated using aerial photography and an
experimental artificial intelligence software provided by Microsoft. While this data is incomplete, and
requires a significant amount of correction, it represents a huge leap forward for activities such as fire
preparedness, flood-plain management, or any other process more concerned with buildings than parcels.

## **Community Services**

Agriculture Extension (AG Center)

- University of Florida (UF) Extension/Environmental Management and Veteran Services members met discussing possible educational collaborations.
- New UF Master Money Mentor program (FMMM) interviews are underway; mentor background checks are
  required. Mentors complete six hours of training. In return, through University of Florida /Institute of Food
  and Agricultural Sciences (IFAS) Extension Volusia County, they provide a minimum of 50 hours a year
  supporting financial/credit workshops for Volusia residents at no cost. Residents learn improved financial
  practices, setting and achieving financial goals.
- The Florida Master Naturalist Program completed two of six-week Core Training in "Uplands Habitats."
   Collaborations with Lyonia Environmental Learning Center, Environmental Management personnel, and volunteers to enhance the educational value.
- Collaboration is underway with the Urban Horticulture program, a Home Owner's Association (HOA),
   University of Florida / Center for Landscape Conservation and Ecology, Volusia County Environmental
   Management, and the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) are investigating a research
   project evaluating effectiveness of post-construction urban soil improvements. Anticipated results are
   improved property values, decreased water and nutrient runoff.
- Master Gardener Plant Clinics are scheduled at nine library locations.
- The Green Industries Best Management Practices class is March 1. This class is designed to improve landscape maintenance practices. Government landscape maintenance employees are encouraged to attend.
- Saturday's 4H County Events had 65 youth participate, Seventeen youth presented in the Speech Contest on
  a variety of topics and even more submitted horticulture, flower arranging, crafts, exhibits, posters, graphic
  arts, over 141 photographs, sewing, canning and baked goods demonstrations. Fashion Revue and Variety
  Show acts were also included.
- SPIN and STEAM Initiatives: Youth from six to 16 learned how to program Ozobots, build simple electrical
  circuits and hydraulic machines.
- The Family Nutrition Program (FNP) met with the School Health Advisory Committee (SHAC) Wellness Policy team finalizing nutrition and food promotion for the Volusia County School's Wellness Policy. Compiled changes will be presented to the school board. School Gardens: Second graders at Westside Elementary reaped their hard work rewards by harvesting carrots, kale, bush beans, tomatoes, sweet peppers, cabbage, and collard greens and consumed on site. They will be preparing their seven raised beds for new spring vegetable crops.

- Blue Lake and Citrus Grove Elementary students learning "MyPlate" dietary standards look closely at fruits and vegetables. They learn that "eating a rainbow" of colors provides the variety of nutrients they need, and what they do for their bodies.
- Three agents enhanced professional development training by attending University of Florida promotion and tenure class.

# **Community Assistance**

- Human Services Advisory Board
  - Human Services staff held a new-member orientation for new board members prior to the regularly scheduled meeting on Jan. 29.
- Neighborhood Stabilization Program
  - Housing and Grants Administration has listed a home for sale in the Holly Hill area that will be
    available to very-low income buyers. Very-low income buyers are targeted as a special funding setaside through the program. The home was purchased as a foreclosed and bank-owned home,
    rehabilitated, and listed for sale.
- Summer Food
  - o Job postings for the summer food program are anticipated to be posted by the end of this week.
- Wind Hazard Mitigation Program
  - Housing and Grants Administration has posted a press release advertising the Wind Hazard Mitigation Program (WHMP). The WHMP provides income eligible households with window and door shutters, upgraded garage doors and gable-end roof tie downs to mitigate damages that may be caused by a hurricane.

### **Community Service**

- Cross training to improve services to clients
  - To improve services to low-income clients, staff from Volusia County Community Assistance and Volusia County Veterans Services, the Department of Children and Families (DCF), and the Florida Department of Health in Volusia County (FDOH-Volusia), participated in an all-day cross-training event Feb. 8.
  - More than 65 staff attended to learn about different services provided through each agency in the community.
  - During the training, each agency in attendance presented its services and answered questions.
  - Attendees also participated in a poverty simulation as a member of a low-income family that had to make tough choices throughout a month.
  - The exercise provided a glimpse into the struggles of a typical low-income family trying to make ends meet.
  - By increasing staff knowledge of services available to low-income citizens, they are better able to
    provide information to clients or a referral to another agency for more assistance. A formal referral
    process will be designed by representatives from Volusia County and DOH staff.

# FDOH adding services in zip code 32114

- The FDOH-Volusia will be adding a clinic in the heart of its East Volusia County client base.
- The office is at 421 South Keech St., which is next to the John H. Dickerson Heritage Library.
- This additional location will improve access to care for FDOH-Volusia clients of which the majority live in the 32114 zip code.
- Beginning March 1, Women, Infants and Children (WIC) services will be available.
- Clinical services for adults and dental care for children up to age five will be available beginning April 1.
- A ribbon cutting ceremony will be held at 9:30 a.m. April 27. A community event will follow from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

- FDOH-Volusia is promoting the new location to the community living near the location through direct mail, presentations at meetings of the Daytona Beach Housing Authority, and through community partners including the City of Daytona Beach.
- Services will continue to be offered at the Daytona Beach, New Smyrna Beach and Orange City locations, and the Chiles Academy.

### Attainable Housing Breakfast, March 1

- The Commission on Homelessness for Volusia & Flagler Counties will host an Attainable Housing Breakfast from 8:30 to 10 a.m. March 1, at the Holiday Inn, 137 Automall Circle, Daytona Beach.
- Attendees will discuss 'Who Needs Housing in Our Community."
- The breakfast is sponsored by the Volusia-Flagler County Coalition for the Homeless.
- The featured speaker is Ability Housing, a non-profit agency with a mission "to build strong communities where everyone has a home."
- RSVPs are required.

### Influenza activity continues to increase statewide

- Influenza activity in Volusia County now is considered "moderate" as the number of confirmed influenza cases continues to increase across the state.
- For week six ending Feb. 9 (the most recent published data), influenza-like activity was above peak activity levels observed during the 2016-17 and 2015-16 seasons.
- This season, Volusia County has reported four influenza or influenza-like illness outbreaks.
- Influenza information is updated weekly on the Florida Department of Health's (FDOH) Florida Flu. Flu shots are available without an appointment at FDOH locations in Daytona Beach, New Smyrna Beach and Orange City.

## Dental client visits increase 20%

As a result of a result quality improvement project, FDOH-Volusia has improved access to dental services.
 Through a client survey, staff determined that a primary reason for broken appointments was the lack of availability of morning appointments on the dental hygiene schedule. The schedule was modified to increase the number of morning appointments to improve the dental retention rate and the number of services provided to clients. This resulted in a 20% increase in client visits.

# Community Health Needs Assessment underway

- FDOH-Volusia and its community partners including the County of Volusia, have launched the 2019 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). The assessment is a collection of data used to inform communities and develop goals to improve health outcomes. All citizens are encouraged to take the survey at countyhealthsurvey.com.
- Results from the survey along with the outcomes of community focus groups will be used to draft Volusia's
  Community Health Improvement Plan for 2019-2022. This planning process is repeated every three years to
  determine the physical, mental, spiritual and social well-being of all community residents. Community
  engagement is paramount to understanding the complex determinants of the community's health.

### Capital Projects update:

- Feb. 8: Five new Beach Safety employees finished the Law Enforcement portion of their training and graduated from the Daytona State Law Enforcement Academy. All five employees received the physical fitness award and have started their field training on the beach.
- Feb. 9: Beach Safety worked with the Town of Ponce Inlet for the eighth Annual Historic North Turn Legends Beach Parade.
- Feb. 9: Beach Safety assisted with the "Beachin' It 5K." This foot race started and ended next to Beach Safety Headquarters. This was the first year for this race which led into the Daytona Beach Half Marathon held on Feb. 10.
- Feb. 10: Beach Safety assisted with traffic control for the Annual Daytona Beach Half Marathon, the runners came over the International Speedway Bridge and entered the beach at International Speedway Beach Approach. They ran north to Main Street Beach Approach, then continued west down Main Street.

  - Feb. 11 to Feb. 17: Beach Safety responded to 1302 different calls for service, which included lifeguard, emergency medical services, law enforcement, and environment issues. The increase in calls is due to more people out enjoying the nice weather.

Beach Safety is also coordinating visits to the local high schools and colleges to distribute the fliers and recruit summer lifeguards.

### Corrections

- The Average Daily Population of week ending Feb. 12 was 1,415 inmates.
  - The Division of Corrections is starting a new fulfillment program in which the inmate population has an opportunity to give back to society. The program includes a volunteer who will be teaching inmates to crochet and knit small hats for children who have been diagnosed with cancer and are undergoing treatment that has caused hair loss. The hats will be donated as a community service type of program.
  - The University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Extension assisted inmate work crews with the planting of potatoes in nine above ground gardens last week in a continuing effort to teach inmates how to grow their own food and establish an adequate food source. It is expected to take 120 days to harvest the crop.
  - One of the County Council Members provided a tour of both the Volusia County Branch Jail and the Correctional Facility.
  - Four inmate work crews were utilized to support the Daytona Beach Half Marathon. The inmate crews were assigned setup and teardown in an effort to reduce the number of county staff required for the event.
