# Information Technology

• Paperless Mowing Inspections: Information Technology and Public Works are working together to extend Lucity functionality to county mowing contractors, in order to improve operations. Mowing contractors,



having completed maintenance work for the County, may now use mobile devices to request an inspection of their work. The subsequent inspection, acceptance, notification, invoicing, and payment operations all happen through the web-based interface and are triggered by automated notifications. This new automated process is saving work for inspectors, supervisors, and clerical staff; the contract manager alone is expected to save 80 hours per year. In addition, inspection information may now be more robust, allowing the attachment of photographs; and communication with contractors is much improved, with shared calendars and event notifications.

#### Revenue

• Amendment to Grant Street Group (GSG) contract: Revenue, along with Purchasing and Legal, recently completed an amendment to Revenue's contract with GSG. The amendment will allow Revenue to electronically request, track, receive and submit property information reports to the Clerk of Court. Florida Statute requires the Revenue Division to provide the Clerk with a list of people/entities to be notified of impending tax deed sales. The amendment with GSG allows Revenue to produce the report and submit it to the Clerk electronically, increasing efficiency and tracking capabilities for the division. There is no cost to the county for this service, as the fee is passed on to the tax deed applicant, as dictated by statute.

# **Community Services**

## Agriculture Extension (AG Center)

- Fifty-two Volusia County growers and professional landscapers attended the Annual St. Patrick's Day Pesticide Licensing Class earning six CEUs (Continuing education Units) each.
- Family Nutrition Program (FNP) staff was acknowledged for their support during the "We're On It" celebration at Read-Pattillo Elementary in New Smyrna. The event was to acknowledge the elementary school for receiving the Gold Healthier US School Challenge (HUSSC) award which FNP helped the school attain by providing nutrition education to both students and parents as well as support for the school gardens.
- The Florida Master Naturalist Program in Volusia County completed the six week core Spring Core Module
  "Uplands habitat". This six week study explores the ecology of Upland habitats in Volusia County like Oak
  Hammocks, Pine Flatwoods and Pine/Oak Scrubs. Twenty-one Professional and retired central Florida
  residents graduated with six of the students reaching the distinction of "Master Naturalist."
- March is the month of the Volusia County's 4-H Schooling Horse Show. Now called The Hooves at the Sands
  it is held at the Silver Sands Bridle Club in New Smyrna Beach. Sixty-one riders from five counties showed in
  English and Western riding classes. Along with youth awards, the goal of the show is to teach youth proper
  riding while encouraging them to meet other youth riders from other clubs in other counties.
- The 4-H SPIN STEAM youth class taught children to determine soil PH and how to correctly compost.
- 4-H Shooting Sports participated in their final winter season class in an Air Rifle Class Tournament.
- One hundred and fourty-five Central Florida residents who raise cattle, horses and goats attended the Annual Spring Ranchers Forum. This day long training is now in its 21 year as the premier program on pasture management that farmers can attend.

## **Community Assistance**

- Housing & Grants
  - In anticipation of the FY 2019/20 Community Development Block Grant allocation, staff conducted an application workshop for 10 participating jurisdictions and county departments
    - The application workshop provided information about proposed funding amounts, eligibility requirements, national objective compliance, and changes to low-income area data.
  - The Volusia County Affordable Housing Advisory Committee (AHAC) completed its required statutory triennial review of 11 affordable housing incentive strategies.
    - The review process concluded with a public hearing held on March 13.
    - The AHAC's recommendation report will be submitted to County Council for their review and action.



- The review of the strategies and status of the implementation of associated recommendations is a requirement to receive State Housing Initiative Partnership (SHIP) funding from the Florida Housing Finance Corporation to provide affordable housing activities in Volusia County.
- Staff that work with the Children and Families Program will conduct a programmatic and fiscal monitoring review of lead agencies implementing programs in nine service categories during the week of March 25.
  - The monitoring will include a review of internal controls and financial management, staffing and personnel, program implementation, methods and timeframes for communication between the lead agency and collaborative partners, and monitoring of collaborative partners by the lead agency.
  - The results of the monitoring visit will be shared with the Children and Families Advisory Board.
- A total of \$399,405 for Summer Camp scholarships will be available to families that meet specific income and age requirements through the Children and Families Advisory Board (CFAB).
  - Four registration sites will be held in April for families that wish to apply. Registrations are being held:
    - April 2 at New Smyrna Regional Library
    - April 4 at Deltona Regional Library
    - April 10 at Midtown Cultural & Education Center
    - April 17 at Thomas C. Kelly (TCK) County Administration Building

### Human Services

- Staff have received training to prepare for the new client/service-tracking software system which will be implemented April 1.
- Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) annual report was submitted to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity.

#### Section 8

- Since the beginning of the calendar year, 18 families have been issued vouchers for Section 8.
  - A voucher enables an eligible family to secure housing.
- o In March, 30 families have been pulled from the Section 8 waiting list.
  - These families were offered an interview to determine eligibility for assistance.

## The Florida Department of Health in Volusia County (FDOH-Volusia)

- Community outreach to faith-based community across Volusia County
  - DOH-Volusia is reaching out to faith-based organizations across Volusia County to encourage participation in the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA).
  - CHNA partners also are planning more than a dozen focus groups to hear directly from Volusia County citizens.
  - The department is developing relationships with these partners to better understand the needs of the congregations as well as the needs that are part of their mission.
  - By working with the faith-based community, DOH-Volusia can work to help them develop place-based interventions that are likely to increase opportunities for health by addressing all of the social determinants.
  - Place-based initiatives concentrate investments in both infrastructure and human capital in a single neighborhood or community to achieve measurable results likely to be sustained by those who live there.

## No-cost HIV and STD testing

- DOH-Volusia's HIV staff continues to work in the community to offer no-cost HIV and STD screening.
- Next month, the department will partner with Halifax Urban Ministries at Hope Place to offer rapid HIV testing and STD screening.
- The April 8 event will be held in recognition of April's National STD Awareness Month and National HIV Youth Awareness Day on April 10.



o Community members also may receive testing.

The Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) project within the Blue Spring basin continues to progress as over 5,100 radio transmitting devices have been reprogrammed or replaced within the County's Del North and Southwest (DeBary) service areas The Utilities division is currently in the 2 year of a 3-year project to convert all water and reclaimed meters to AMI technology as a water conservation initiative benefitting customers and enhancing water distribution efficiency.

## Operations

Completed the inspection process and obtained operating permit renewal from the Department
of Environmental Protection for the Halifax Wastewater Treatment facility in the northeast
service area. The plant is one of seven county wastewater treatment facilities and treats over
200,000 gallons per day. The new permit has been renewed through March 2024.
