COMMUNITY SERVICES

Community Assistance: The Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) program has left over funding available to assist households that have experienced a financial hardship during the COVID-19 pandemic. Eligible households may receive up to nine months of rental and utility arrears and three months of forward assistance. Applications will be accepted continuously beginning at 9 a.m. on May 4. The ERA application portal will remain open until the current funding has been depleted. During that time, county residents may submit an application online at www.volusia.org/era. Navigators will be available during normal business hours at each of the libraries as well as the ERA office in DeLand to assist applicants with completing the application. Corrections: The Corrections Division has resumed an effective program that was running full speed prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, dog obedience training. On April 25, the Halifax Humane Society delivered two dogs to the Correctional Facility for obedience training. As a recap to this program, two inmates are assigned to a dog and work under the supervision of a Humane Society employee to train the dogs on basic obedience. Once the dogs are trained, they will go up for adoption if they have not already been adopted. Road & Bridge: The Knox Bridge Submarine Cable Replacement project will soon be underway with the staging of the contractor's barge on the northwest side of the channel. The L.B.
