AVIATION & ECONOMIC RESOURCES

Operations: Staff prepared for the increase private jet parking on airport property due to the Coke Zero 400 NASCAR race, which included extra operations agents during peak times (race driver/teams arrivals and departures).

Projects & Maintenance: The terminal emergency generator project is underway, with the contractor locating the underground utilities lines; some site work and grading will begin after Labor Day. Resource Stewardship:

Community Assistance: Community Assistance is accepting applications to financially assist driver education safety programs in public and nonpublic schools in Volusia County. The funds shall be used for direct educational expenses and shall not be used for administration costs. The driver education program must be available to all public and nonpublic schools with students in grades 9-12 that offer driver education instruction programs. The driver education program must also be available to students in private school and students that are homeschooled in grades 9-12. Applications are being accepted for the upcoming year, October 1, 2022 – September 30, 2023. Applications will be accepted through September 2, 2022.

Community Assistance is accepting applications from agencies interested in becoming an approved Affordable Housing Partner (AHP). The homebuyer assistance program is implemented with the cooperation of agencies known as AHPs to assist income eligible first-time homebuyers in the purchase of a home by providing purchase assistance and closing costs. An AHP agency can be a non-profit entity, lender/broker, real estate company or builder. The AHP is the primary contact and liaison between Community Assistance and all vested parties involved in the purchase of the home. Applications must be submitted on behalf of an agency, not an individual. Applications are available at www.volusia.org/AHP and will be accepted through September 6, 2022.

The Volusia County Summer Camp Scholarship program concluded on August 5, 2022. The program provided scholarship vouchers to 732 school-aged children that attended summer camp at one of the 51 approved scholarship camp sites throughout the county. A total of \$267,944 was used to provide scholarships to incomequalified families that met the program criteria established by the Children and Families Advisory Board. Fire Rescue: Volusia County Fire Rescue is reading and gathering information on the newly released Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for the 2022 Building Resilient Infrastructure Communities. PUBLIC WORKS

Coastal: The Coastal Division worked in cooperation with the Orlando Utilities Commission, Coastal Conservation Association of Florida, Shell Oil, and McCulley Marine to deploy 350 tons of concrete culverts, stormwater structures and blocks as well as 30 tons of granite to create three new artificial reefs at the County's newly permitted artificial reef site approximately 2.75







miles east of Lighthouse Point Park in Ponce Inlet. These artificial reefs will meet the growing demand for nearshore fishing destinations in State Waters. Two additional reef sites have been permitted 10 miles north and 10 miles south of the inlet. The Coastal Division plans to make additional reef deployments to these new sites next spring. Engineering & Construction: Concrete sidewalk construction at the Marine Discovery Center is 70% complete and work is anticipated to continue through November. Pond construction is expected to be complete by the end of August and underdrain construction to be completed by the middle of September. A minor modification to the restroom location was made to accommodate water and sewer line tie-ins and final approval was received to begin construction. Mosquito Control: Mosquito Control is educating residents through social media and in-person residential inspections about common household items that may produce biting mosquitoes in their yards. Mosquito larvae can live in small amounts of water found in items such as kids' toys, animal water containers, tarps, buckets, and plant saucers. Dumping this water at least once a week will break the life cycle and reduce biting mosquitoes. Volusia County is currently under a Mosquito-Borne Illness Advisory from the Department of Health due to an instance of locally acquired West Nile virus. Water Resources and Utilities: An award of contract for engineering services for the expansion of southwest regional water reclamation facility is scheduled for Council consideration on Sept. 6. The proposed scope of services includes design, permitting, pre-construction services, and grant assistance support associated with expansion of treatment capacity from 2.7 to 5.0 million gallons per day; a Class A biosolids management treatment facility; and an additional reclaimed water ground storage tank between 5.0 - 10.0 million gallons.
