Revenue

- 20,550 renewals for the 2020 Business Tax receipt year were mailed on July 1. Business Tax receipt renewals are now payable and are due by Sept. 30.
- The Revenue Division's public payment site was modified to comply with Senate Bill 248 which revised the
 definition of "home address" for confidential accounts.

Community Services

Agriculture Extension (AG Center)

- UF/IFAS Extension Volusia County office has cooperated for decades with the University of Florida
 Lakewatch program. Lakewatch is state funded and uses volunteer, citizen scientist to collect water samples
 throughout Florida. The science findings assist Florida Environmental Protection and is often the only water
 quality data available on important lakes, springs and creeks. Forty-six Volusia County lakes have been
 tested over these years. Volusia County now has a certified Florida Lakewatch trainer. Once interested
 county residents are trained, they can participate in this rewarding program. For details visit, fl lakewatch@ufl.edu
- Twenty-four pesticide license exams were administered.
- Urban Horticulture
 - Met with representatives from Spring Hill Resource Center and the Spring Hill Community Garden to
 plot a path for the future of the garden.
 - Master Gardeners did extensive amount of work to solarize the beds at Spring Hill Community Garden.
 - Met with the Vice Mayor of Deltona, Victor Ramos at the Derbyshire Community Garden. Deltona wants to duplicate the success of the community garden at Derbyshire at one or more locations within Deltona.
 - Met with the new director of the AdventHealth/Fish Memorial Foundation to discuss the plan for starting and completing the garden at the Orange City campus before the end of 2019.
 - Met with "Project Vineyard" to discuss creation of a community garden at the Chiles Center in Daytona. They hope to secure funding and have an operational garden by January 2020.
- UF/IFAS Extension Volusia County is gearing up to offer a four-hour financial literacy course to residents
 referred through Human Services. This course focuses on helping renter households maintain financial
 stability. Topics include rights and responsibilities of renters, budgeting, savings, credit use and credit
 repair. The class will be offered monthly.
 - o UF/IFAS Extension Volusia filmed a Feral Hog segment for Volusia Magazine.

Community Assistance

- Human Services
 - Conducted an outreach event at Cedar Oaks apartment complex where ten low-income senior citizens were able to complete and submit Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) Home Investment Partnership (HOME) energy credit applications.
 - The first financial literacy class via the Western Union Settlement program took place on July 12.
- Housing & Grants
 - On July 3, the New Smyrna Beach Development Corporation, an instrumentality of the Housing Authority of New Smyrna Beach, held a ribbon cutting to celebrate the completion of construction of a duplex in the historic westside community of New Smyrna Beach.
 - The duplex included \$200,000 of State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) funding.
 - The project was also funded with New Smyrna Beach CRA funds, and land donated by the city
 - The two bedroom units will be rented to low-income elderly and disabled households at affordable rents.



- Since the beginning of the fiscal year, using State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) and HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME) grant funds, a total of 13 eligible households were provided with funds to rehabilitate or reconstruct their existing owner-occupied homes.
- Summer Camp Scholarship Program applications are still being accepted. To date, a total of 1,415
 applications have been processed, 1,340 children have been offered scholarship vouchers and 1,114
 vouchers have been submitted to approved providers.
 - Staff will continue to process applications through the end of the program and will reimburse approved providers for weeks that children with scholarship vouchers attend.

Florida Department of Health in Volusia County (FDOH-Volusia)

- Update: Hepatitis A outreach continues to target high-risk populations
 - As of July 22, 176 cases of hepatitis A have been confirmed in Volusia County this calendar year. In all of 2018, five hepatitis A cases were confirmed in the county.
 - The Volusia County Health Department (CHD) continues to focus on reaching three high-risk populations by offering vaccinations and prevention education.
 - The high-risk populations are: drug users and residents of drug addiction treatment facilities, the homeless population, and inmates at correctional institutions.
 - Volusia CHD staff continue to meet with municipal and county public safety responders, correctional facilities, local hospitals, drug treatment facilities and organizations that work with the homeless to share outreach materials.
- Stop the Spread' message shared at annual Daytona Beach Juneteenth event.
 - The annual Juneteenth event in Daytona Beach drew nearly 2,000 people recently.
 - Staff from the Volusia (CHD) participated to share information about rapid and routine HIV testing.
 Rapid HIV testing and onsite results were offered by Outreach Community Care Network, a Volusia
 CHD community partner.
 - To further encourage testing, know your status promotional materials such as water bottles, power banks, fans, and more were distributed.
 - Educational materials were also provided on sexually transmitted disease testing, hepatitis, Preexposure prophylaxis (PrEP) and more.
 - The event reached residents in a community with high HIV rates and also offered the opportunity to build relationships and focus messages to stop the spread of these diseases. WIC, dental and environmental health programs also participated.

Library Services

- Youth services is off to a busy start in the libraries this summer with ongoing story times as well as special
 programming for school age children to help stem the summer slide, kindergarten readiness for the soon to
 be kindergarteners, and many stream (science, technology, reading, engineering, art, and math) programs.
 - Along with our programs, the libraries are providing breakfast and lunch at eight locations this summer. Libraries are on pace to serve more children this summer than we did last summer.
 Through the month of June, we have served 3,498 meals to children of all ages.

Natural Resource Protection

- The 2019 sea turtle nesting season began on May 1. The season will run through October 31. As of July 5, there are 681 nests on our beaches, including two confirmed Kemps ridley nests, the rarest of all sea turtle species.
- Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) staff assisted the coastal division and the company, CFB Outdoors with early access to the beach for the July 5 cleanup.



Marine Science Center (MSC)

- The roofing project was completed above the turtle hospital, and the MSC began admitting injured sea turtles as of July 8.
- On July 8, construction began on the bird hospital flight cage replacement. Construction is estimated to continue until mid-September.
- o Bids for a new touch pool exhibit came in under budget and a recommendation of award is awaiting approval as of July 8.
- During the week ending July 5, the MSC hosted five visiting summer camps, with 220 children, who
 participated in an environmental education scavenger hunt.
- During the week ending July 12, the MSC hosted seven visiting summer camps with 183 children that participated in an environmental education scavenger hunt.

Water Quality

- On July 9, staff conducted routine water quality monitoring on four stations on Indian River Lagoon.
- On July 10, staff conducted routine water quality monitoring on three stations on Turnbull Creek.
- On July 11, staff conducted water quality monitoring on two retention ponds in Port Orange for Road and Bridge.
- On July 11, staff participated in configuration training with the new WebPortal water quality software.

Ocean Center

Events

- The CEO Fighting Game Championships returned to Ocean Center June 27-30 and brought well over 9,000 gamers and spectators and 3,000 room nights to the area for the tournament. In addition a live AEW (All Elite Wrestling) Fyter Fest event was hosted in conjunction with the tournament on June 29 and was near capacity with over 4,000 tickets sold! This CEO Fighting Game championship filled the entire 200,000 square feet of the Ocean Center and featured an artist alley, exhibit and vendor area, the Jebailieyland Arcade with more than 60 games, and more than 14 tournaments and finals in the CEO Ring.
- The beginning of July has given the Ocean Center a very small window of time for turn-around and deep cleaning before we welcome two of our largest week long youth camps, Student Life Youth Conference and New Spring Church. The entire arena permanent seating was deep cleaned the first week of July. The Ocean Center kitchen also saw a major cleaning/repair project with all equipment, ovens, etc. removed and the floor pressure washed and repaired. During this time the Ocean Center Maintenance team patched and repaired walls and repainted the entire kitchen while all the equipment was removed.

Capital Projects update

- A1A Marquee:
 - All of the concrete columns and beams have been poured and forms removed. Concrete is complete. Frames that will hold the new digital signage were rejected by OC Project Manager. New frames and top cap are due to be complete July 12.
- Arena Barrel Roof/ Parking Garage Roof:
 - The arena barrel roofs and all six parking garage roofs are complete.
- Arena Elevator Modernization:
 - Council approved bid award on June 4. All documents are now complete. In process of scheduling a project kick-off meeting.
- Garage Decking:



Task Assignment approved for ARC Engineering to begin preparing bid documents for project.
 Kickoff meeting was held on April 16. ARC's structural engineer has completed his inspection.
 Drawings are being created and specifications are being developed. Due to new developments, structural engineer conducted a second inspection to resolve issues discovered with connection plates. A proposed repair sequence has been presented and adjustments to the scope of services is being prepared.

Garage Elevator Vestibules:

o Bid was awarded for replacement of the vestibules on the sixth level of the garage. Contract and purchase order to contractor are ready to be issued. Notice to proceed issued June 10. Permit has been obtained from City of Daytona Beach (CODB). Anchor layout is complete. Waiting on results of x-ray survey to insure anchors will not hit any internal reinforcement.

• LED Lighting:

A follow-up meeting with TLC Engineering was held on July 3 to review 30% documents.

Documents have been approved and consultant has been instructed to proceed with design. A lengthy conversation was had in reference to the possible ballroom ceiling redesign.

 - Over the last week Beach Safety responded to 1,456 different calls for service, which include lifeguard, emergency medical services, law enforcement and environmental issues.
 - o July 2: staff was interviewed by channel 2 regarding the June 30 shark bite and beach safety.
 - July 6: Firecracker 5K at Frank Rendon Park in Daytona Beach Shores, staffed by one Beach Safety specialist.

Corrections

- The Average Daily Population of week ending July 1 was 1,312 inmates.
- The Average Daily Population of week ending July 9 was 1,327 inmates.
 - Lightning strikes from the last storm disabled the video visitation system. The level of damages are being determined.
 - The corrections director provided a "Jail update" to the Public Safety Coordinating Council on July 1, at the Emergency Operations Center.
 - Correction director met with Public Works director to discuss training and employment opportunities
 for the inmate population. Three areas were discussed: flaggers, CDL operators and mowers. Initial
 plans are underway to train selected inmates to be flaggers, which can be used by Public Works on a
 daily basis.
 - Two new bills were signed into law and took effect on July 1. These bills will impact the Corrections
 Division in the following ways:



- House Bill (HB) 49, Dignity for Incarcerated Women. This bill requires correctional facilities, including jails, to provide female inmates with healthcare products and prohibits a male correctional officer from conducting a pat-down or body cavity search of a female inmate with certain exceptions. The bill defines the term "healthcare products" to include feminine hygiene products, including tampons, moisturizing soap that is not lye-based, toothbrushes, toothpaste, and any other product the correctional facility deems appropriate. Healthcare products must be made available in common housing areas and medical facilities, at no cost, and in a quantity that is appropriate to the needs of the inmate. A "correctional facility employee" is defined as a correctional officer employed by a correctional facility, including a county detention facility.
- Senate Bill (SB) 168, (Immigration Enforcement), the Volusia County Corrections Division (VCDC) has entered into a Basic Ordering Agreement with the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agency, which requires Corrections Division staff to honor "Detainment Orders" and hold an immigrant for up to 48 hours once they are being released from VCDC custody.

Coastal

- Beach Management/ Independence Day Weekend Preparation

 - o Six pre-stage dumpsters were deployed over the Independence Day weekend.
 - Additional janitorial contract staff were continuously moving from location to location performing restroom cleaning, replenishing supplies and picking up litter.
 - o Twenty-five contract staff walked the beach and coastal parks picking up trash.
 - Fifteen trash carts emptied trash cans, picked up large items and offered to collect trash from patrons each day of the holiday weekend.
 - On July 5, 19.14 tons of garbage including 1.61 tons of recyclables was collected north of Ponce Inlet and 6.61 tons of garbage including 0.87 tons of recyclables was collected south of Ponce Inlet.
- Coastal Parks
 - An animal control detail was provided to conducted enforcement of leash laws at Smyrna Dunes Park on July 4 and 5.
 - Contractors removed dead oak trees from Lighthouse Point Park in Ponce Inlet. These trees where most likely killed by wind damage during Hurricane Irma.
 - Coastal trades-workers constructed a split-rail fence at Toronita Avenue Beach Park in Wilbur-by-the-Sea.

Mosquito Control

Operations

- Field inspectors conducted surveillance and treatment of mosquito larvae by ground and boat due to large amounts of recent rainfall. Requests for service from the public have decreased over the last two weeks, dropping from 222 (June 8 21) to 124 (June 22 July 5).
- Sentinel chickens are screened for antibodies at 12 different locations throughout Volusia County for arbo-viruses such as West Nile Virus, Eastern Equine Encephalitis, and St Louis Encephalitis. During hurricane season it is normal to see increased mosquitoes and antibodies. Although these viruses don't hurt the chickens, by monitoring them and mosquito populations we can focus our operations to be the most effective. We are beginning to see those increases and will continue to monitor and treat for them throughout the year.
- Through continued surveillance of adult mosquito populations, Mosquito Control has planned and conducted targeted ultra-low volume (ULV) truck operations. There were 26 ULV operations treating over 34,300 acres.
- Crews continue to conduct door to door inspections of various neighborhoods, responding to service requests and educating the public while treating what they found.

Road & Bridge

• Construction Maintenance

- Drainage maintenance crews completed repairs to a failed drainage pipe headwall off of Botts Landing Road in the DeLand area.
- Drainage construction crews installed new drainage pipe and constructed drainage swales along Hamilton Street the New Smyrna Beach area. This work was initiated based on a citizen request concerning localized flooding in the area.
- Inspection crews conducted a video inspection and inventory of existing drainage pipes and structures along North Beach Street in the Ormond Beach area. This work is performed to assess the condition of the existing drainage conveyance system and to update assets in the GIS infrastructure map and database.
- During the month of June, maintenance crews responded to 32 citizen requests for pothole repairs and installed 246 tons of asphalt for road patching and pothole repairs.

Solid Waste

- On July 2, County Council approved staff to negotiate with the top ranked firm of FCC, SA to provide residential solid waste collection services for the unincorporated area.
- Disposal Activities: In the past two weeks, the Tomoka Farms Road Landfill received and processed over 14,286 tons of garbage, 4,907 tons of construction and demolition debris, and over 4,106 tons of yard waste.
- Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event: On June 29, the Solid Waste Division hosted an off-site
 household hazardous waste collection event at DeBary City Hall. The event had 391 customers drop off
 3,395 lbs. of lead acid batteries, 104 fluorescent light bulbs, and 2,645 gallons of mixed household
 hazardous waste for proper disposal. Customers also dropped off 3,150 pounds of household chemicals
 and 5,344 pounds of paint for reuse available free of charge at the Tomoka Farms Road Landfill in Port
 Orange.

- Annual Water Quality Reports for 2018 The Water Resources and Utilities Division routinely monitors 11
 community water systems for more than 90 regulated contaminants in drinking water according to federal
 and state laws. Annual water quality reports for the 2018 calendar year were recently presented to our
 customers for each of these systems and are available online on the Water Resources & Utilities website
 under the "Drinking Water Quality Reports" section.
