COMMUNITY SERVICES

Community Information: Staff continues to respond to media inquiries stemming from Hurricane lan, such as damage estimates, permitting, housing and shelter, and assistance resources available in the community. The division maintains continuous contact with other divisions to disseminate information via news releases and social media posts. OCEAN CENTER

The Pop Warner Cheer East Coast Conference hosted a competition in the arena and ballroom on Oct. 23. Approximately 3,000 people attended the event. Grace House will host its Annual Fundraising Gala in the ballroom on Oct. 27, with 160 attendees expected. Signature Equipovision will move into the arena on Oct. 27, for their Amway Conference, which will be held from Oct. 28 through Oct. 30. The private event is estimated to generate 1,500 room nights and 4,500 attendee days. The Hometown Heroes Banquet, hosted by the Daytona Beach News-Journal, will take place in the ballroom on the evening of Friday, Oct. 28. Florida Concrete and Products Association will utilize the exhibit hall, several meeting rooms and west surface lot for a private event on Oct. 28 and Oct. 29. They estimate 500 attendees and 174 room nights. Team Rubicon continues to utilize meeting rooms 203 and 204 and portions of the exhibit hall dock and south lot for Hurricane Ian relief efforts. PUBLIC PROTECTION

Animal Services: The division welcomes the new Clinic Supervisor, Becky Haze, who started in her new position Monday, Oct. 17. Animal Services has been providing 24-hour personnel to evacuation shelters before the onset of the storm to assist with pets at the shelters. All pets in the shelter have been examined and treated by the veterinarian. Five pallets of cat food and six pallets of dog food will be delivered to Animal Services on Oct. 25 for staff to distribute supplies to pet owners impacted by the storm in the form. In addition to food, collars, leashes, and other supplies, as well as veterinary care and medications to treat sick and injured animals. There has been an overwhelming response

Emergency Management: Emergency Management continues to support the affected areas through the Disaster Recovery Center and provide resources to those areas of need. Emergency Management is still handling Hurricane Ian calls from the public due to the closure of the Citizens Information Center. Mosquito Control: Mosquito Control staff are responding to Hurricane Ian by conducting county-wide surveillance to monitor mosquito larval and adult populations. Field inspectors are larviciding areas of standing water to prevent larval mosquitoes from emerging into biting adults. The division is also collaborating with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services to conduct aerial operations in response to widespread biting mosquitoes. These operations, using fixed-wing aircraft, began on Oct. 19 and continued nightly into the week, weather permitting, until completion. Road & Bridge: Road & Bridge is responding to a multitude of service requests after Hurricane Ian. Tree crews are addressing leaning and hanging trees that are encroaching the right-of-way. The drainage crews are cleaning and removing obstructions from stormwater systems. The road crews are repairing eroded areas that were inundated with flooding and grading dirt roads. Solid Waste: The Tomoka Farms Road Landfill and West Volusia Transfer Station facilities reopened Saturday, Oct. 1, after Hurricane Ian. Since then, the Tomoka Farms Road Landfill has operated seven days a week, processing 4,564 tons of storm-related demolition debris and 3,933 of storm-related vegetative debris. Water Resources and Utilities: During the FY 2021/22, a total of 3,012 continuous water use and 585 high consumption alerts were sent to customers. The utilities support team contacts customers advising of continuous 24-hour use, indicating possible leaks, and unusually high consumption during a 72-hour period, indicating inefficient irrigation use. These proactive measures help customers avoid costly bills and potential damage within the home.
