AVIATION & ECONOMIC RESOURCES

Daytona Beach International Airportc - Air Service/ Marketing/ Customer Experience: Airport Director Karen Feaster and Marketing/Customer Experience Director Joanne Magley were the featured speakers for the Daytona Regional Chamber of Commerce Eggs & Issues hybrid, Zoom meeting April 8. The presentation included updates on the airport's capital projects, health and safety measures during COVID-19 and air service development. Operations: Early planning has begun for the Airport's Table Top (November 2021) and Full Scale Exercises (March 2022). It is yet to be determined the scale of these exercises due to COVID restrictions; guidance from the FAA on this requirement will be forthcoming.

Community Assistance: Summer camp scholarship applications will be made available online for income eligible families with children between the ages of 5-12 who have completed kindergarten and are entering grades 1-6. Individuals up to age 17 attending an approved special needs camp are also eligible. Scholarships cover a seven week period beginning on June 14-July 30 and can be used at one of over 40 approved summer camp sites. Extension Services: The Extension Services team held a citrus under protective screen (CUPS) field day at Vo-LaSalle Farms in DeLeon Springs. 36 citrus growers from around the region learned about the latest CUPS production research from UF/IFAS specialists. Begun in April, the Extension team has expanded financial counseling outreach to include residents with unexpected medical treatment expenses. Library Services: Volusia County Library staff, along with other area public libraries, worked with Girl Scouts of Citrus Council to develop and launch a "Library Love" patch. OCEAN CENTER

Events: Cheer and dance teams from top universities throughout the county gathered in Daytona Beach to compete in the NCA/NDA College National Cheer Championship. After a hiatus in 2020 due to the pandemic, the event returned to the Ocean Center and Daytona Beach Bandshell, marking 40 years of competition and 25 years in Daytona Beach. "Twenty-five years ago, our annual championship took place in the Southwest. We had barely 1,000 participants and were struggling to grow. We knew our event had great promise, but the destination wasn't a draw," said Bill Boggs, senior vice president of the National Cheerleaders Association. "So we reassessed and looked to Florida. While many towns weren't interested in hosting our event, Daytona Beach recognized our potential and welcomed us with open arms. And here we are, 25 years later, with a reputation as the single largest collegiate cheer and dance competition in the world!" The fiveday event not only provides competitors, as well as their friends and family, an opportunity to experience all that the Daytona Beach area offers, but also supports the local community.



The 2021 competition took place April 7-11 at both the Ocean Center and Daytona Beach Bandshell. Attendance is limited due to the added safety protocols that have been implemented to mitigate and reduce the spread of COVID-19.

There are still 150 college teams with over 3,000 coaches and athletes scheduled to participate (which is excellent considering the challenges), and 174 teams scheduled for the Daytona Beach Classic (a youth cheer event that took place April 11) with over 2,800 participants. This event, as for all events, masks are required and social distancing is enforced.

Animal Services: Animal Services will be training on the county's new volunteer management software system; they are the first division to utilize the program. AS has added nine approved volunteers and seven of which are current active volunteers who have logged a combined total of 609 volunteer hours to date for 2021. Mosquito Control: Mosquito Control is collaborating with the Florida Medical Entomology Laboratory to submit *Culex* mosquitoes collected from routine mosquito traps for blood meal host analysis. This project data will support field operations to target common *Culex* mosquitoes in Volusia County that are the potential vectors of West Nile Virus and St. Louis Encephalitis.
