Central Services

Hurricane Dorian - performed necessary pre-storm measures to ensure facilities secured, insurance
measures completed, sandbags deployed to county facilities, generators fueled and inspected and staged
personnel at ECO, TCK and Administration building.

Information Technology

- Hurricane Dorian The arrival of Hurricane Dorian presented an opportunity for Information Technology to
 exercise updated disaster plans and protocols. The radio team programmed radios and provided spare
 batteries to field personnel, while systems and data center staff provided an unprecedented level of on-site
 support throughout the storm. In total, 53 employees logged nearly 900 hours on preparation, response,
 and recovery efforts. Though this storm turned out to be largely a drill exercise; opportunities for further
 improvement will be identified and implemented for the next storm.
- Faster Internet Users of the County's voice and data network are now connected to the Internet with a new high-speed connection from AT&T. This new connection operates at 1 gigabit per second; or 10 times



faster than the Internet link previously used by the County. Users casually browsing websites may not notice much difference; but anyone using cloud-based software to manage business data will see a significant increase in performance.

Revenue

- Business Tax Receipts Processed applications for 46 new business tax receipts.
- Hurricane Dorian prepared all four offices for storm:
 - Photographed all locations to use for insurance and FEMA claims, if necessary.
 - Verified communication plan to be used during the storm and post storm.
 - Reviewed cash procedures and ensured that all cash/checks will be secured before, during, and after the event.
 - Reviewed business needs/statutory deadlines before, during, and after projected landfall.
 - Requested that the Clerk of Court postpone the tax deed sale scheduled for Sept. 3.
- Legacy Award Revenue received the 2019 Legacy Award for Financial Operations. This award recognizes
 advances in innovation/efficiency, customer service, and budget, and is awarded by the Florida Tax
 Collectors Association. Revenue received the award primarily due to the work done to set up an "e-box" for
 scheduled bill pay transactions. The new system not only saves taxpayers time and money, it created an
 efficiency of over 35 man-hours per month in the Revenue Division.
- Tax Deed Applications (properties with tax certificates that have not been redeemed)
 - 44 certificate holders began tax deed applications.
 - Received eight tax redemption payments from property owners for pending tax deed applications.
 This action stops the tax deed process.
- Tourist Development Tax Conducted seven site visits for suspected tourist tax evaders.
- Transactions Processed over 11,100 payment transactions, totaling over \$5.4 million across all revenue offices and platforms.

Community Services

Community Assistance

- Human Services
 - Three presentations at various senior citizen centers throughout the county were completed.
 - The indigent cremation pre-bid meeting was held Aug. 28, approximately 10 persons were present.
- Housing & Grants
 - Homebuyer Assistance has provided down payment and closing costs assistance to 57 households during the fiscal year.
 - Since Oct. 1, 16 homes have been hardened with hurricane shutters for windows and doors, upgraded garage doors and gable-end tie downs through the Wind Hazard Mitigation program.
 - The closing of the sale of the Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) house located in Holly Hill was completed. This home was part of the grant's low-income set aside and was sold to a household with income at 50% or less of the area median income.
 - A competitive application was submitted for Disaster Recovery Hurricane Irma to DEO seeking funding for a necessary storm water repair in Orange City on Aug. 27.
 - The Children and Families Advisory Board (CFAB) established a subcommittee made up of four board members to develop a plan for evaluating service categories, risk factors, and scopes of work for community needs funded met through the Request for Statement of Qualification (RSQ) process.
 - The subcommittee met on Aug. 30 and identified a subcommittee chair and vice-chair.

 Submitted a grant application for additional vouchers/funding to assist 30 non-elderly and disabled individuals and their families who are experiencing homelessness through the Mainstream Voucher Program.

- Update: Hepatitis A outbreak
 - As of Sept. 20, 233 cases of Hepatitis A have been confirmed in Volusia County this calendar year.
 In all of 2018, five Hepatitis A cases were confirmed in the county.

- Natural Resource Protection



- The 2019 nesting season runs through Oct. 31. As of Aug. 30 there were 965 nests on our beaches.
 This breaks our previous record of 919 nests in 2012.
- Met with staff from the Department of Health to review the implementation of the Indian River Lagoon wastewater rules.
- o Staff prepared for Hurricane Dorian and were on the beach immediately after the event to reestablish the Conservation Zone poles, and to assess impact on sea turtle nests.
- Through the end of July the Environmental Permitting Activity has performed 10,710
 Permits/Inspections/Reviews. This is an 8.8% increase over the same time last year. In addition they have handled 8,447 Phone Calls/Walk-ins/Emails, a 16.8% increase over last year.
- Marine Science Center (MSC)
 - The Marine Science Center was closed to the public from Aug. 31 Sept. 5, for preparation and recovery from Hurricane Dorian.
- Water Quality
 - o Conducted water sampling on three Stations on Deep Creek in south west Volusia County.
 - Attended the 31 Florida Lake Management Society Annual conference.
 - Water sampling was cancelled for seven stations due to Hurricane Dorian. These sampling events will be rescheduled.

Planning and Development Service

Meetings: On Aug. 29, the staff review meeting was held for Land Development related applications. There
were five items on the agenda.

Ocean Center

Events

- The Ocean Center hosted the HT Hackney Foodservice Expo as scheduled on Aug. 23 and 24. Approximately 1,500 people attend this arena floor event.
- We had planned to end August and open up September with the very popular Jurassic Quest Dinosaur Show Aug. 29 Sept. 1. With the uncertainty surrounding both the track and the timing of Dorian's approach to the coast the Show cancelled the event and we are currently negotiating 2020 dates with this group. This show would have generated almost \$100k in revenues to the Ocean Center with attendance of over 10,000 and concessions upwards of \$30,000. Last year the show was in the Exhibit Hall. This year they had expanded to fill the Arena floor in addition to the Exhibit Hall so this was a blow to our 4th quarter.
- Hurricane Dorian cut into the following weekend. Both the Boat Show (Exhibit Hall) and the SE Spa/Hot Tub
 shows postponed their exhibitions. The Boat Show has rescheduled for the weekend of Sept. 27-29. The Spa
 show will fall later in the fall. While all these events will ultimately repeat (which is a good thing), two of the
 three will also reschedule after the close of the fiscal year which means our fourth quarter will reflect this
 impact.
 - The facility fared well during the storm with only minor water intrusion into the kitchen area due to a torn roof membrane which was quickly patched during the storm by our Operations and Engineering team members that were on site during the storm.

Capital Projects update

- Arena Floor Box Replacement: Testing of the existing electrical conductor is being arranged through the electrical engineer. Testing is scheduled to begin Oct. 7 due to events schedule.
- Arena Elevator Modernization: Construction has begun on the arena lobby elevator. New hydraulic
 equipment and controller have been installed. Currently working on the new wiring being installed.
- Ballroom Airwall Refurbishment / Replacement: A recommendation has been received from Hall & Ogle stating it is in the best interest of the county to replace the airwalls. Additional meetings are scheduled to discuss the spec and layout for the new walls.
- Exterior Door Replacement: Scope of work has been reduced to include replacement of only the east lobby doors. Developed a plan to rebuild existing door hardware on the rest of the building in house.
- Garage Elevator Vestibules: Structural steel and roof has been installed at the northeast elevator. Field
 measurements for the glass storefront is complete. Glass storefront is being manufactured.



- LED Lighting: 60% construction documents have been delivered and are being reviewed by Ocean Center staff. It has been decided to proceed with the original scope of work for the ballroom ceiling and not do a full replacement / upgrade at this time.
- Parking Contract: New garage access control equipment is being installed on the Earl Street side of the
 garage and is in its final stages. Testing of the new equipment is scheduled for week of Sept. 16. Ora Street
 entrance equipment will be installed once Earl Street entrance is complete.

 - Photo documented all coastal assets including dune walkovers, parks, restrooms, ramps and seawalls.
 - Coastal contractors removed trash cans, port-a-lets and toll booths from the beach and disassembled shade structures, shut down showers and restrooms.
 - Coastal staff finished shutting down showers, restrooms, splashpad and refueled vehicles.
 - 10 a.m. Sept. 4. Coastal staff inspected, identified and documented all existing damage. Dune
 walkovers that sustained damaged or where a greater than eight inch drop off occurred due to
 beach erosion were closed. Coastal restrooms reopened and upland showers/splashpad turned on.
 On-beach showers turned on once storm surge receded.
 - Coastal admin staff prepared a cost estimate of damages.
 - Sept. 5. Coastal contractors replaced trash cans, port-a-lets and toll booths to the beach and reassembled shade structures.
 - Coastal staff assisted with the FDEP Beaches and Coastal Systems Hurricane Dorian beach erosion assessment, this included ground-truthing of beaches countywide to measure, document and characterize dune recession and beach erosion.

Mosquito Control

- Operations
 - Field inspectors conducted surveillance and treatment of mosquito larvae by ground and boat due to large amounts of recent rainfall. Requests for service from the public significantly decreased to 59 for the two-week period prior to Dorian (148 for Aug. 3 – Aug. 16).
 - Thirty-three thousand acres were treated prior to the Aug. 29 suspension of ULV operations for Hurricane Dorian.
 - o Post-storm surveillance is underway to plan treatment operations following Hurricane Dorian.



 Prior to the arrival of Hurricane Dorian, equipment and vehicles were staged at several inland sites such as the Tomoka landfill and the Sheriff's office operations site on Tiger Bay Road and the helicopter was flown to the Orlando Convention Center.

Road & Bridge

Dorian Prep

- Road & Bridge began preparations for Hurricane Dorian on Aug. 26, included: Installing debris handling attachments on all heavy equipment, and fueling and testing of generators and large pumps.
- Equipment to be used for push and shove operations in the Northeast quadrant of the County was staged at the Tomoka Landfill. Equipment for the Southeast quadrant of the County was staged along Tomoka Farms Road near the New Smyrna Speedway. Equipment for the Northwest quadrant of the County was staged at the DeLand facility and the equipment for the Southwest quadrant of the County was staged at the Osteen facility.
- Road and Bridge drainage crews opened the sluice gates at the recently constructed Rio Way
 Stormwater Pond in Holly Hill to lower the water level in the pond to create additional storage
 volume for the storm. The pond was lowered approximately three-feet by Aug. 30.
- Inspected inlets, ditches and stormwater systems to ensure they were functioning properly in anticipation of a significant rain event.
- From Aug. 27 thru Sept. 2 crews assisted Corrections with sandbag operations by hauling fill material and bags to various locations throughout the County.

Dorian Operations

- Road & Bridge's forward operations center (FOC) activated at 1 p.m. on Sept. 3. Personnel staged to ride out the storm the DeLand Road & Bridge facility (Westside) and the Tomoka Landfill (Eastside).
- Both Bascule Bridges (Highbridge & Main St.) were secured by late evening of Sept. 3. The Coast Guard was notified that bridge operations for marine traffic were suspended until the storm had passed.
- Westside Road & Bridge crews began push and shove operations on Sept. 4. Very little debris and downed trees were encountered. The push and shove operation was completed by 4 p.m. with all County roads opened and cleared. Both bascule bridges resumed normal bridge operations by 11 a.m.
- Two small sailboats came loose from their moorings and came to rest against the Main Street Bridge pilings. The Volusia County Sheriff's Office Marine Unit assisted Road & Bridge staff in towing the boats away from the bridge and securing them near the bank of the river. The bridge was inspected where the boats impacted the pilings and no damaged was observed.

Post Dorian

o Road & Bridge tree crews picked up the minimal amount of vegetative debris and inspected inlets, ditches and stormwater systems to ensure they were functioning properly after the event.

Solid Waste

- Disposal Activities: In the past two weeks, the Tomoka Farms Road Landfill received and processed over 13,751 tons of garbage, 6,012 tons of construction and demolition debris, and over 4,937 tons of yard waste.
- Disposal Activities: On Aug. 31, the Tomoka Farms Road Landfill processed three times the average number of residential customers as residents prepared for Hurricane Dorian.
- Illegal Dumping Enforcement: Solid Waste Management Compliance Officers investigated a report of
 commercially generated tree debris that was illegally dumped on San Jose Boulevard in Daytona Beach.
 Officers were able to identify the offender, requiring them to clean up and properly dispose of the debris at
 the Tomoka Farms Road Landfill.
- Waste Collection: On Aug. 20, County Council approved the solid waste non-ad valorem assessment resolution #2019-103 setting the FY 2019-20 rate at \$255 and capping future assessments at \$310 per year for residential improved real property in the unincorporated area of Volusia County. The non-ad valorem assessment funds collection, disposal, administrative, recycling processing costs, and a storm reserve.

Water Resource and Utilities

- Implemented full scale activation of pre-storm protective measures at the 16 water and wastewater treatment facilities, 124 lift stations, and 26 water production wells, and ensured all emergency generators, by-pass pumps, radios, and monitoring equipment in full service.
- Completed annual maintenance and annual flow testing of 1,509 fire hydrants within all county utility service areas. Performed over a period of 12 weeks, preventative maintenance ensures reliable supply and water pressure for fire protection.
