GROWTH & RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

Environmental Management: The Marine Science Center celebrated the release of a juvenile hawksbill sea turtle on July 15. The turtle, called Timon by the rehabilitation staff, stranded in November 2020 and was severely underweight and not responsive. He was treated with fluids, antibiotics and vitamins, and had to be tube fed for more than 6 months. He slowly recovered from his illness and nearly doubled in body weight during his stay.

Hawksbill sea turtles do not nest on Volusia County beaches, but can be found in our offshore waters. Like all of the sea turtle species, hawksbills are rare and are federally protected.



OCEAN CENTER

Events: This week we are hosting North Point Ministries for their InsideOut Daytona 2021 Youth Conference July 17-23.
