

What are household hazardous wastes?

Household hazardous wastes are products that are toxic to the environment. They can contaminate water supplies and are common in homes or garages. They should not be placed in the garbage.

Household hazardous wastes include, but are not limited to:

- used motor oil
- automobile batteries
- household rechargeable batteries
- gasoline
- paint, thinners and solvents
- pesticides and fertilizers
- fluorescent bulbs and compact fluorescent bulbs
- pool chemicals
- cleaning supplies
- sharps (needles)

Motor oil

Motor oil is banned from landfill disposal and cannot be placed

with your garbage. Because motor oil can contaminate water supplies if improperly disposed, county residents should recycle used motor oil only at oil recycling igloos at county fire stations and other facilities. For a list of igloo locations, call us or go to volusia.org/recycle.



Used paint

The "leave some, take some" free paint exchange at the Tomoka Landfill lets residents

(no businesses, please) trade unwanted paint for a different color or type. Change a color, or just leave it. About 300 gallons of paint are recycled at the paint exchange each month. The facility provides paint to nonprofit organizations and families in financial need. For more details, please contact the landfill at 386-947-2952.



Car batteries

Car batteries may be taken to "buy-back" centers for recycling. Please call Volusia Recycles at 386-943-

4905, 386-257-6021 or 386-423-3862 to find a location near you. By law, all stores should accept and recycle your old auto battery when you purchase a new one.



Electronics recycling

Residents may drop off obsolete electronics (including computers, monitors, printers and televisions) at the

household hazardous waste sites at the Tomoka Landfill and West Volusia Transfer Station.

Needles and diabetictesting strips

The Florida Department of Health offers a sharps disposal program to help residents with certain illnesses, such as diabetes, dispose of hypodermic needles properly. Improper disposal could pose a public health hazard. The program is not intended for healthcare providers or businesses.

Residents may drop off needles and diabetic testing strips in approved red sharps containers without charge at these Florida Department of Health offices:
