The next location traveling south is Shell Harbor Boat Ramp. It is also located in Pierson and borders Lake George.






Participants walked around the area and used boats, airboats, and canoes at Shell Harbor Boat Ramp to clean Lake George.

Several individuals launched canoes while others walked outside of the park in search of trash.








Ed Stone Park is located on State Road 44 in Deland. There were several groups that joined us for the cleanup. We had Volusia County Solid Waste join with recycling information.


