## ORDINANCE 2025-06

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF VOLUSIA COUNTY, FLORIDA, RELATING TO THE LAND DEVELOPMENT CODE OF VOLUSIA COUNTY; AMENDING CHAPTER 72, ARTICLE III DIVISION 8, SECTION 72-778 STORMWATER MANAGEMENT PERMIT; AMENDING CHAPTER 72, ARTICLE III, DIVISION 8, SECTION 72-779 PERFORMANCE, REVIEW, AND DESIGN STANDARDS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Business Impact Estimate is provided in accordance with section 125.66(3), Florida Statutes. - b. Comprehensive Plan amendments and land development regulation amendments initiated by an application by a private party other than the county;
- c. Sections 190.005 and 190.046, Florida Statutes, regarding community development districts:
- d. Section 553.73, Florida Statutes, relating to the Florida Building Code; or
- e. Section 633.202, Florida Statutes, relating to the Florida Fire Prevention Code.

In accordance with the provisions of controlling law, even notwithstanding the fact that an exemption noted above may apply, the County hereby publishes the following information:

1. Summary of the proposed ordinance (must include a statement of the public purpose, such as serving the public health, safety, morals and welfare):

The proposed ordinance will amend portions of Chapter 72, Article II, Division 8, Stormwater Management sections 72-778 and 72-779 regarding Stormwater Management Permit Review and Stormwater performance, review and design standards to promote public health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Volusia County.

- 2. An estimate of the direct economic impact of the proposed ordinance on private, forprofit businesses in the County, if any:
- (a) An estimate of direct compliance costs that businesses may reasonably incur;

There is flexibility in the types of stormwater management systems implemented to meet performance-based design criteria and what type is used may impact additional costs incurred, both initially and during long-term maintenance. Site specific conditions such as topography, soil type, basin type and impervious area will also impact the design standards for the stormwater management system and thereby the cost. Increased fill requirements and/or size of the stormwater system could also increase the cost to comply with Seasonal High Ground Water Table Elevations and there also could be additional compliance cost associated with additional soil borings and inspections of the stormwater systems relating to flood protection, attenuation, design storm recovery and/or special basin criteria.

(b) Any new charge or fee imposed by the proposed ordinance or for which businesses will be financially responsible; and

There may be fees associated with verification and approval by the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD). There are no additional new charges or fees contemplated.

(c) An estimate of the County's regulatory costs, including estimated revenues from any new charges or fees to cover such costs.

There may be minimal additional costs associated with the stormwater amendments for staff time coordinating the basin studies with project engineers if basin studies have not been conducted previously. There may be minor staff costs for communicating with property owners and/or contractors/developers.

3. Good faith estimate of the number of businesses likely to be impacted by the proposed ordinance:

There are a total of 5,609 contractors doing business within Volusia County based on permits pulled, any of which could potentially be impacted, as well as any local, regional or national developer or property owner who seeks to develop a subdivision on land within the County, both unincorporated and incorporated.
